On the 21st of August the top hockey team, the St John's Blue Sticks, competed in the interschool hockey cluster day.


The St John's Blue Sticks competed in many different matches, some easy, and some really hard. Fast paced games, are intense.

BREAK A LEG

The phrase "break a leg" is a popular expression used in the performing arts to wish actors good luck before a performance. Despite its seemingly negative wording, the phrase actually conveys a positive sentiment.

The origins of "break a leg" are somewhat unclear, but several theories exist. One suggests that the phrase originated in the theatere, where it's believed that wishing someone good luck could actually bring bad luck, so people began to wish the opposite in the hopes of bringing good fortune. Another theory points to the practice of "breaking" the line of the leg while taking a bow or curtsey, indicating that the actor has performed so well that they deserve multiple curtain calls. Some also trace the phrase back to the vaudeville era, where performers hoped to be so successful that they would have to "break a leg" of their chair or prop due to overuse.

Regardless of its exact origins, "break a leg" has become a widely used and cherished part of theatre tradition.
