# TE WIKI O TE REO MĀORI



Te Wiki o te Reo Māori is an annual celebration for all New Zealanders to show their support for the Māori language, an official language of this country.

The theme for Te Wiki 2024 is 'Ake ake ake – A Forever Language'.

In World War II, the 28th Māori Battalion marched into Europe singing "Ake! Ake! Kia Kaha e!" Today "ake, ake, ake" is a phrase we hear often, particularly at the end of karakia (prayer) and speeches symbolising a unity and solidarity in what has been shared... it emphasises that what is, will forever be. It represents the resilience, adaptability and endurance of our language. It also reflects the commitment New Zealanders have to embracing and learning te reo Māori long into the future.

Under enduring pressure te reo Māori has shown it will adapt and survive. It grows with our people, our culture and our environment. We can think of te reo Māori as a seedling with potential. Raised with others, given care and effort, it can grow and give shelter for future generations. Every action we take helps to make te reo Māori a living language across Aotearoa. Over this week the tamariki will be involved in different activities, finishing with an assembly this Friday at 2:00pm which you are welcome to attend.

Yesterday, our staff took part in a quiz testing their own te reo knowledge, to enter a draw for an official Te Wiki o te reo Māori hoodie. Congratulations to our winners, Miss Duff and Mrs Chandler. This Friday at assembly there will be a children's draw for an official Te Wiki o te reo Māori sweatshirt. With three to give away, one name will be drawn from Year 1 and 2, one from Year 3 and 4 and one from Year 5 and 6. All tamariki are automatically entered into the draw.

# ATTENDANCE DUES AND CATHOLIC SPECIAL CHARACTER CONTRIBUTION FOR 2025

The Board has received notice from the Auckland Common Fund Limited that Attendance Dues will be raised by \$4 per term in 2025 to \$133 per term [\$532 per annum]. The Catholic Education Services Board are currently reviewing the Catholic Special Character Contribution Donation. If there is a change we will let you know as soon as it is communicated.

Financial Assistance with Attendance Dues is available to families of Preference students in cases of genuine financial difficulties. Part of the criteria for receiving this assistance is that regular payments have been made at an affordable level. On our school website under INFORMATION – FEES (and ENROLMENTS) there is a full explanation of our fees and information about the Inland Revenue Tax Deductibility of all the fee areas. Attendance Dues are not tax deductible.

# **WĒTĀ UNLEASHED**

At their August meeting, our wonderful PTFA, in addition to all the other support they give the school, agreed to financially support an extraordinary trip for our Year 6 students. This is to acknowledge their leadership and to recognise the service they have given to the school. This support enables us to offer an extraordinary trip, that would otherwise be impossible. They have generously committed to this initiative for the next six years, meaning that all current students will benefit from this when they are in Year 6.

This year we took the children to Weta Unleashed, an interactive and immersive tour taking the children behind the scenes of make-believe film sets and allowed them to get hands on with movie special effects, props and out of this world characters. All students also participated in a hands-on practical effects artistic workshop where they learnt how to create and apply prosthetic wounds and scars.

On Friday the 6th of September the St. John's Yr6s (including me) went to Weta Workshop. We went to see what set designs and special effects look like in real life, because we're doing a school show.

We had the best time. First Room 6 got to go make pretend scars, they looked so realistic. We used silicone to make the base of the scar, then we used isopropyl alcohol to activate the special paint in different colours. There was black, old blood and blood. We also made fake blood by using sugar syrup and red, blue and yellow food colouring.

Next it was our turn to do the tour. We got to see things from three different movies: a horror, a fantasy and a sci fi. The first one that we saw was the horror. It was called Fauna. It was about a family who moved into a barn because they didn't look properly and there were scary creatures. We had to go through a scary tunnel to get to the fantasy but there was a way around so I and some other people went that way.

Then we moved on to the fantasy movie Age of the Ever Clan. The fantasy movie was about dinosaurs that evolved into a more human look but they were still dinosaurs. There were two families of dinosaurs, the Ever Clan which were nice kind dinosaurs that ate plants. Then there was the other family, who were vicious meat eaters. We got to see a throne and draw and make things out of clay and tinfoil.

The last but not least thing that we saw was Origins the sci fi movie. We got to see a light show. The extra terrestrial/alien showed us where it came from and what happened to it. I think it was the best part.

All the Yr6s would like to thank the P.T.F.A. because this awesome trip wouldn't have been possible without them. We also would like to thank the teachers for coming and spending their day so we could have a fun time. 
